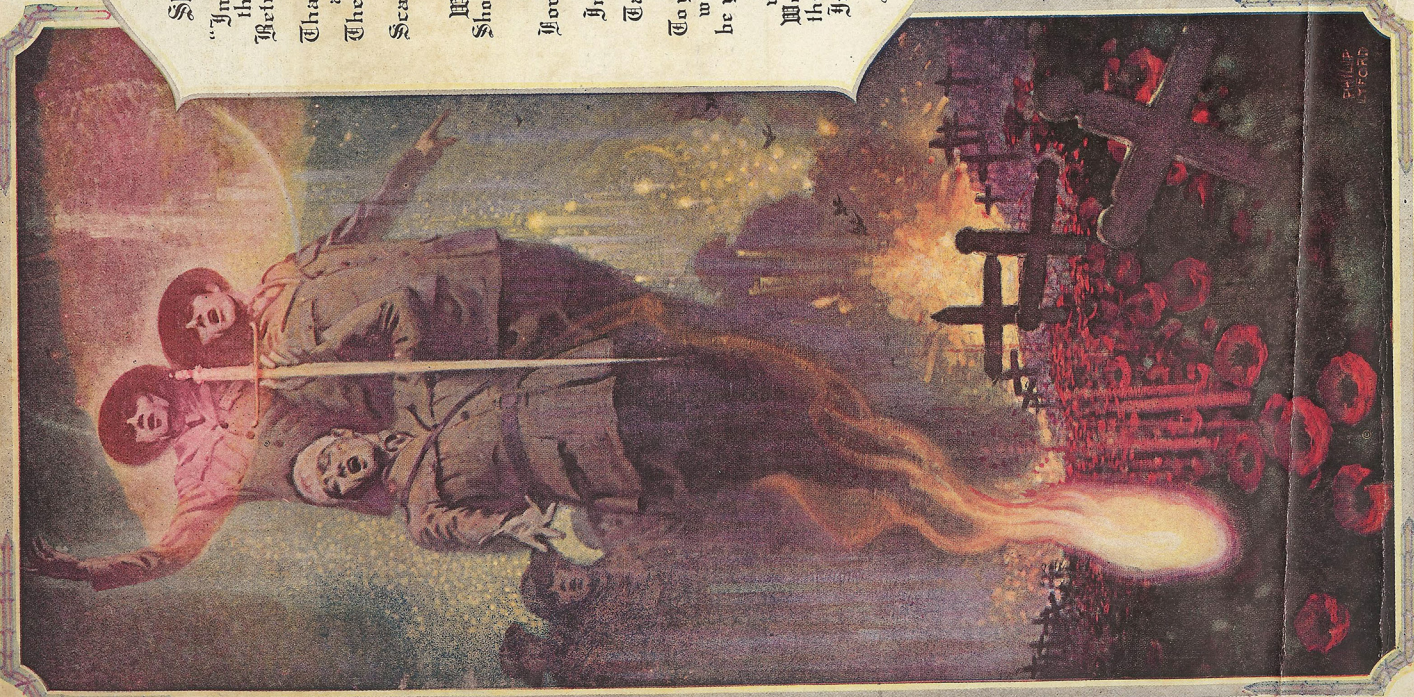
This beautiful lyric of the war was written by Lieutenant Colonel Dr. John McCrae of Montreal, Canada, while the second battle of Ypres was in progress.

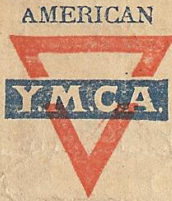

Well, this is some town the people here treat us very nicely only some of the politicians are very cold to us. We get fine food here and nothing to do but drill all day and parade. The weather here has not been so good lately but that's nothing it always rains over here. I saw by the papers to day that Harward's outfit left for.

The U.S.A. am very glad
to know it (he always was
lucky).

Since I have been here
was on two fronts the Champagne
and Verdun. and believe me I
saw some action with the Marines.
One day we advanced 28
kilometres, some drive eh?

Was slightly wounded up
at Verdun but am all right now.
(expect to be home at least by
1920)

I think our stay at the
front has made a man out of me.
any how it put the fear of

God in me at times when you
hear the sharpnel go ZZZZZZ - bang!
thats the time you start praying
(thats if you have time).

Well I guess thats all
for a while. Give my regards to
everyone.

re-enlist for four years.

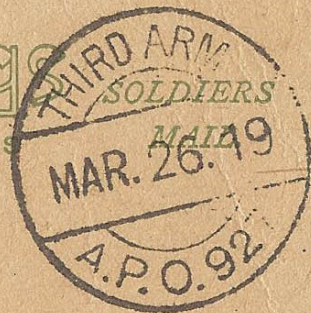
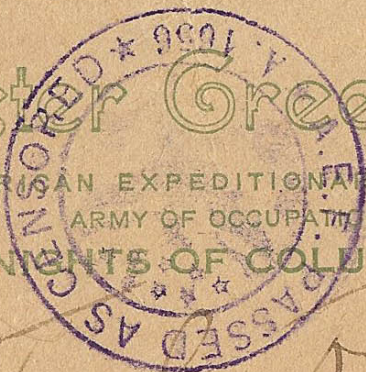
The Home Guard is a
