Dear folks:

The weather here has moderated considerably and it has just begun to rain. It is very hard work here cleaning up while we are waiting for our exams, which we expect to do. The meals here are excellent but much too regular beans, beans! Old all the time. I am beginning to gain weight and am gaining up nicely. We have very clean & comfortable barracks fitted with ice water, running water and shower baths. I am writing this from the YMCA and the boys are just singing and playing on the piano and annoying me. I'm very much satisfied with the post here and wish we would stay here longer but we expect to be on our way "over the fence" as they call it when we are taken

from quarantine to the barracks.  
after we pass another physical exam.

We are stationed near the  
rifle range and the continuous firing  
is deafening and distracting but the  
rain will stop the shooting for a  
while and we will have news.

is scarce have received none yet.

Sunday June 16.

Dear Folks:

Arrived safely at Paris Island. This is surely a wonderfull camp there must be 10,000 men here and an average of 200 coming in daily. I have excellent quarters with a Chaplain and a few nice fellows the food or "Chow" as they call it is really excellent as good as home. I have to take another physical exam. to morrow with the rest of the bunch and hope to pass it, if I do not I will be sent home.

There are 200 barracks in this camp and they cover over 10 square miles.

I am now at the YMCA house singing songs and looking at moving pictures with the bunch. The YMCA is a wonderfull institution if you get a chance surely give as much as you can as it is a worthy cause.

The weather here has been

terribly oppressive but the air is  
very dry and we do not mind it. The  
temperature to-day climbed to.

118 in the shade and we were in the  
shower rooms for about an hour.

The officers here are very nice the  
cleanest whitest men that Vany Camp  
ever had and the men are the same, so  
far I have not met any body that  
I know but there surely must be  
some body here. We walk around  
cleaning up most of the day and expect  
to start our military training about  
Tuesday when we also get a vaccination.  
We get our prophylaxis and injections  
in about a month or six weeks.

This morning we had a very interesting  
lecture telling us about the doings of the  
marines, we still in quarantine and  
expect to stay here for about a week.

Well the bugle is sounding for  
inspection now so will close with  
lots of love from.

The U. S. Capitol at Washington, D. C., was begun in 1793, the cornerstone of which was laid by George Washington. The central building was finished in 1800, one wing in 1811, and was burned by the British in 1814. It ranks today among the noblest architectural objects in the world, its crowning glory being the Statue of Freedom which mounts its dome 307 feet above the esplanade. At one end is the U. S. Senate, at the other the House of Representatives, the combined Chamber whose members represent the greatest government undertaking in the world. It is 751 feet in length and 350 feet in width and covers an area of three and one-half acres. On its east central portico the oath of office is administered to each succeeding President by the Chief Justice of the U. S. Supreme Court before a multitude of spectators.
