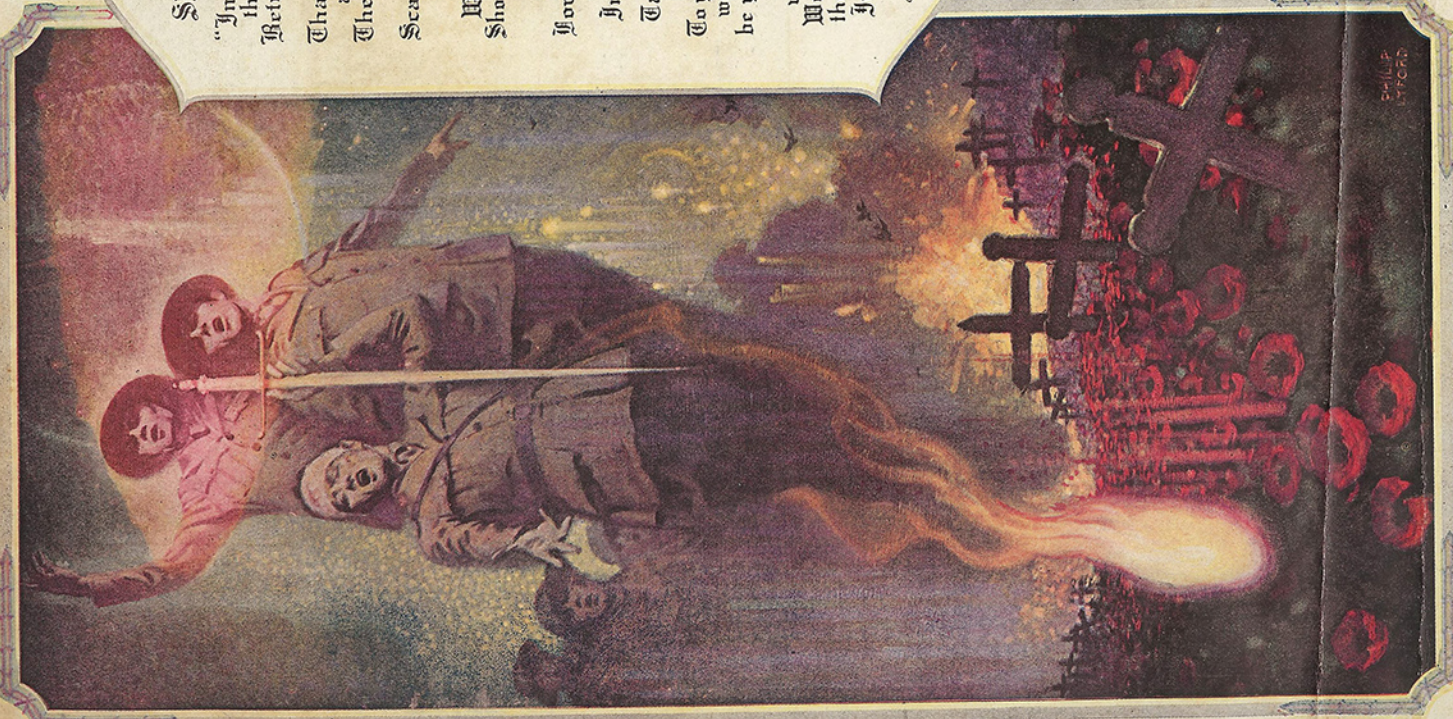
This beautiful lyric of the war was written by Lieutenant Colonel Dr. John McCrae of Montreal, Canada, while the second battle of Ypres was in progress.

The weather here has not been so good lately but that's nothing it always rains over here. I saw by the papers to day that Howard's outfit left for.

The U.S.A. am very glad
to know it (he always was
lucky).

Since I have been here
was on two fronts the Champagne
and Verdun. and believe me I
saw some action with the machines.
One day we advanced 28
kilometres, some drove.

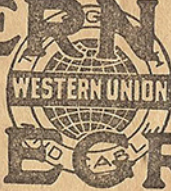
Was slightly wounded up
at Verdun but am all right now.

I think our stay at the
front has made a man out of me.

for volunteers and I will
re-enlist for four years.

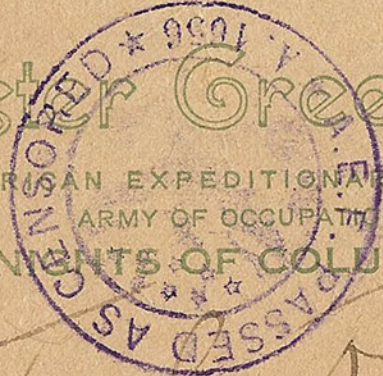
The Marine Corps is
